

A MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Reflecting on this past year, I am reminded of the impact that meaningful, inclusive experiences have on our youth. More than ever, young people need environments that nurture relationships, spark curiosity, and inspire them to envision and pursue bright futures. Research shows that supportive communities and structured programs are crucial in youth development. Our programs provide vital academic interventions and lay a foundation of self-awareness, social responsibility, and community connection. They provide youth with the tools and support to navigate life's challenges, develop confidence, and embrace new opportunities. As we reimagine Kid Power's possibilities, we have centered our approach on social-emotional skill building and listening closely to our community to develop programs and activities that encourage all of us to go "beyond limits."

This year, our youth showed us the transformative power of authentic connection. When young people feel seen, heard, and supported, they start to believe in their potential and reach beyond what they once thought possible. We've seen firsthand how mentorships open doors to career pathways, how structured literacy support turns struggling readers into confident learners, and how hands-on wellness activities inspire students to take ownership of their health and surroundings. Our youth have not only grown personally, they have also embraced a commitment to giving back to their communities. This year, our team provided new opportunities for skill-building to fuel this commitment. In an advocacy workshop with DC Justice Lab, youth practiced elevator pitches to voice their passions, preparing for Capitol Hill Advocacy Day. We also expanded our Youth Ambassador Program, offering workshops on leadership, self-regulation, self-care, and advocacy, equipping them with tools to strengthen their impact within the classroom and beyond.



During one of these workshops, our 5th-grade student ambassador, Rayln expressed,

"In my speech, I talked about how you could help people with their homework and help them with other things they need. I honestly would like to see more kindness spreading; there is not enough kindness in the world. That would help people talk it out instead of hurting people over the smallest things."

Looking ahead, we are inspired by our community leaders and community-driven insights as we plan for strategic growth. We are focused on:

Expanding our High-Impact Tutoring program to address pandemic-related learning loss;

- Integrating social-emotional skill-building across all programs;
- Redesigning our evaluation framework with a comprehensive logic model; and
- Creating new opportunities for youth to engage in meaningful service learning.

These efforts build on the experiences and insights we've gained this year, positioning Kid Power to not only reach more young people but also broaden our program's impact and scope. Our vision is bold, but with the dedication of our team, partners, and supporters, we are ready to ensure every young person has the opportunity to grow beyond limits.

AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM

Throughout 40 program weeks, Kid Power delivered our comprehensive after-school experience to students in grades 2nd-8th. Students participated in Academic Power Hour daily, receiving homework help, tutoring, and engaging in educational activities. Our weekly STEM projects focused on engineering, architecture, and transportation. These weekly activities fostered collaboration and helped students improve communication skills, sparking curiosity and teamwork.

In our Citizenship activities, students embraced democratic principles, participated in our Kid Power Ambassador campaign, and completed service-learning projects supporting the unhoused and crafting pet toys for shelters. Our Health & Wellness component featured VeggieTime lessons that teach students relationship skills and responsible decision-making as they learned about nutrition, healthy foods, and how they affect one's health.

Our social and emotional wellness was the cornerstone of our program, cultivated through daily KP Circles, guided by the CASEL framework, create a safe and inclusive space, enabling students to express themselves openly, support one another, and foster a strong sense of community and belonging, and our "Art with A Purpose" lessons that helped improve students' self-awareness and self-management while participating in mindfulness activities and emotional regulation exercises.

STUDENTS APPLYING TECHNIQUES BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

During the school year, we observed significant growth in student autonomy and social-emotional learning (SEL), as students demonstrated remarkable progress in communicating with their peers, regulating their emotions, and supporting each other. At Stanton Elementary, one student's progress was evident during a soccer game when he recognized his emotional struggle and sought help from his After-School Instructor. With guidance, he applied techniques from KP Circles to regain composure and return to the game, showcasing the real-world impact of selfregulation skills. This example highlights how KP Circles equip students with valuable life skills they apply both in and out of the classroom.

IN-SCHOOL PROGRAM

Kid Power took another step forward in its commitment to food access and security by welcoming a new VeggieTime Director, Nikki Oliver, who deepened our engagement with students, families, and school community members. Despite the absence of FoodCorps members, we harnessed the strength of our community volunteers and senior staff to maintain our Produce PopUps, garden spaces, and food security initiatives. This period allowed us to forge stronger community partnerships and actively involve our staff in strategic expansion efforts.

To further expand food access, we introduced a new "Buy-In" program with **FRESHFARM**, allowing families to purchase locally sourced produce directly from local farmers at market value, avoiding grocery store markups. Kid Power's expertise in serving under-resourced communities led to our selection as the exclusive distributor of produce grown by the **Friends of the National Arboretum** (FONA) at the Washington Youth Garden.

Aligned with our After-School program, students immersed themselves in hands-on garden activities, learning horticulture and garden maintenance. Fall lessons covered plant biology, ripeness, harvesting, soil health, and composting. Winter brought lessons on animals' roles in food growth, growing in harsh climates, and foraging. In partnership with FONA, students prepared seedlings for spring, where they then took charge of their gardens—choosing crops, plotting gardens, and designing layouts, emphasizing youth voice and choice.

VOLUNTEERS MAKING A LASTING IMPACT

Throughout the year, volunteer groups support garden maintenance, beautification, and renovation across our schools. These partnerships have been invaluable in enhancing our garden spaces but also in strengthening community engagement and collaboration.

HIGH IMPACT TUTORING

5TH GRADE STUDENT, MALCOLM X ELEMENTARY

We were thrilled to significantly expand our High Impact Tutoring (HIT) program from 20 students to 120 at three high-priority Ward 8 DC Public Schools: Stanton Elementary, Savoy Elementary, and Malcolm X Elementary. Over 22 weeks, we provided targeted tutoring three days per week, with focused 30-minute sessions for small groups of 1-3 students.

Our dedicated community tutors, rigorously trained and coached in the Leveled Literacy Intervention (LLI) curriculum by our HIT Director and Coordinators, supported students in achieving remarkable growth. This team worked closely with school staff and administrators to create school-approved schedules aligned with students' English Language Arts (ELA) intervention blocks, ensuring seamless integration. Tutors also participated in the Brown University/Stanford SEL "Tips for Tutors" Program to further enhance Social Emotional Learning (SEL) growth, program impact, and overall wellness outcomes.

We also expanded our reach by forming partnerships with three additional partner schools. This expansion aligned with DC Public Schools' curricular priorities and strengthened our existing partnerships. We selected the UFLI Foundations curriculum as our core curriculum for the 2023-2024 school year, setting the stage for even greater success in the future.

A TUTOR'S JOURNEY OF GROWTH AND DEDICATION

Sabrina Mathis, a Tutor at Savoy Elementary, emerged as our most improved employee of the 2022-23 school year. Sabrina brought immense passion but initially felt overwhelmed by the instructional demands. Dedicated to her growth, Sabrina attended all training sessions with curiosity and focus. She proactively sought feedback and support demonstrating a consistent openness to learning and improvement. Week after week, Sabrina worked tirelessly towards mastering her instructional skills, showing remarkable growth and development. Staff witnessed Sabrina's transformation, noting her increased confidence and competence with all students, including those with behavioral challenges. Sabrina's dedication is epitomized by her work with a student who receives special education services and faces significant working memory and phonics issues. Volunteering to tutor this student, Sabrina's relationship-building and instructional efforts have improved his phonics skills and academic confidence.

MENTORING & ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

"You've got to care; some people dive into mentoring because it sounds good, but your heart has to be in it. If it's not, it's a waste of time."

Our mentoring program continues to be a transformative force in the lives of older youth in DC, fueling remarkable growth in their relationships, academic success, career exploration, and community connection. During check-ins, youth shared how their mentors have influenced them, with 92% noting improvements in academics and 100% highlighting their mentors' role in career exploration. The program has also had a significant impact on community bonds, with 80% of youth feeling more connected through their mentoring relationships, creating a stronger, more united community.

One of the most treasured aspects of these mentoring relationships was the energy and openness of the mentors. Many of our youth highlighted their mentors' positive energy and approachable nature as their favorite qualities. These traits became even more cherished in long-term relationships, with 83% of youth in matches lasting more than two years as the most valued aspect of their mentor's support. Mentors themselves reported experiencing profound changes through their involvement with 90% gaining a deeper connection to their community.

To support our strategic growth, we hired a second Program Manager to focus on expanding mentor and partnership development, leading mentor recruitment and training efforts while building partnerships for mentor recruitment and PowerUp! Career Exploration opportunities.

GUIDANCE BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

Our staff connected high school junior Jennifer with mentor Jurley Camacho, a Senior Associate at the Inter-American Development Bank. What began as a virtual mentorship quickly became a meaningful relationship, with the pair meeting in person for coffee, cooking sessions, and visits to the U.S. National Arboretum. During one of their outings, Jurley shared a powerful metaphor about "cracks in the road," reassuring Jennifer that her choices would always guide her back to the right path. This message deeply resonated with Jennifer, offering her a fresh perspective on her future.

Jennifer's hard work paid off as she graduated high school and was honored with an \$8,000 scholarship at Kid Power's graduation event, and she accepted a full scholarship to Cornell University.

4TH GRADE STUDENT, BARNARD ELEMENTARY

In the summer of 2022, Kid Power collaborated with DC Public School Summer Acceleration Academies to bring our free summer programs to Barnard Elementary in Ward 4 and Garfield Elementary in Ward 8. This initiative successfully engaged 115 youth from 2nd to 5th grade, offering a unique blend of enriching academic instruction, opportunities to build new friendships, and fun summer activities. Students explored the elements of air, earth, water, and fire through hands-on social-emotional learning activities, making the summer memorable.

Building on this success, our 2023 summer camp at Bancroft Elementary in Ward 1 continued our partnership with DC Public School Summer Acceleration Academies. Over five weeks, we supported 90 rising 2nd to 5th graders, enriching their experience through collaborations with key program partners. **Urban ForestKids**, led nature-immersion activities that took students out of the traditional classroom and into green spaces, fostering comfort in nature and curiosity about local plant and animal species.

Additionally, our partnership with **Sidwell Friends School** provided engaging sessions such as "The Science of Food," where

students explored DNA and moon phases using snack foods, and "Digital Art," where campers created self-portraits using iPad drawing tools. Kid Power also supported ELSAP students by offering basic translations in the curriculum, ensuring inclusivity for students with limited English proficiency.

Our focus on STEAM programming has been a cornerstone of these summer programs, inspiring students and families. This success has motivated us to expand our STEAM offerings during the school year, continuing to prioritize innovative, hands-on learning experiences.




